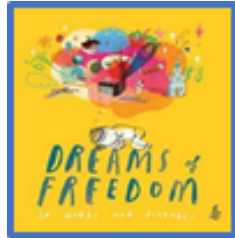
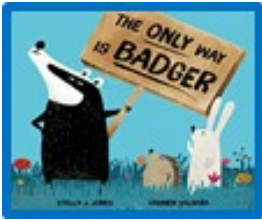

Igniting Prior Knowledge:

- Britain is a democratic society.
- There is a difference between dictatorship and democracy.
- There are political parties who differ in their views.
- People have opportunities to influence decision by voting in elections.
- There are laws in society to keep us safe – fireworks, owning animals etc.
- Laws can be local or national e.g. inner city pollution.
- People can influence laws surround issues – protests, strikes, petitions, writing to MPs, joining campaign group or charities.
- Contributions and influence from individuals and organisations can have social and environmental change.
- Local councils organise services under the guidance of central government.
- Local council provides services such as schools/education, housing, health, welfare payments, transport, environment (e.g. green bin charges).
- There are limited resources for the needs of the community.
- People may have different views about how the council money should be spent.
